

Roe v. Wade - What it means for our Emergency Department Patients

On June 24th the Supreme Court overturned the landmark decision of Roe v. Wade, placing access to abortion and women's health care in peril. Shortly after, national ACEP issued a [statement](#) expressing concern about laws that interfere with the Physician-Patient Relationship.

[About half the states have trigger laws](#) that have gone into effect that either restrict or outright prohibit abortions, including the neighboring state of West Virginia. Other states, like Pennsylvania and Virginia, are awaiting further action by lawmakers and the courts to determine if and how abortion access will be affected.

In this tumultuous time of access being restricted or prohibited to basic women's medical care across the country, Emergency Physicians can expect to see more self-managed abortions, medical tourism for abortions from surrounding states, and more severe emotional effects on patients with new, unplanned and/or unwanted pregnancies. Dr. Koyama composed an [excellent article](#) highlighting challenges in attaining adequate care for pregnant women and steps that EM physicians should consider when navigating this new, legal landscape.

Above all, it is imperative to remember that the [obligations of EM physicians](#) have not changed with the overturning of Roe v. Wade. We are still bound by an ethical, professional, and a legal duty to provide stabilizing treatment to all emergency department patients presenting with an emergency medical condition. This obligation "preempts any directly conflicting state law or mandate that might otherwise prohibit or prevent such treatment. Thus, CMS is making it explicitly clear here that the federal EMTALA requirements will always apply regardless of what state laws are in place."

Fortunately, Maryland does not have laws in place that restrict or prohibit abortions. While there is debate about scope expansion, Maryland recently [adopted a law](#) that will permit NPs, PAs, and nurse midwives with specialized training to perform abortions, in an attempt to increase access to medical care.

Changes Coming to Emergency Department Documentation Requirements

Expect to see some changes to the documentation required for Emergency Department visits starting January 2023. While the changes have not yet been finalized, the guidelines are expected to change for the first time in nearly 30 years. Take a listen to the [ACEP Frontline interview](#) with Maryland's own, Dr. Jason Adler, as he discusses the 4Ds of Medical Decision Making that will be needed for our documentation and how this documentation shift is a positive change and will better reflect the hard work and complex decision making we do every day in the emergency department.

MDACEP Key Focus Areas

Maryland ACEP held a Chapter Board and Committee meeting on June 17, 2022.

The public policy committee provided an overview of the accomplishments during the Maryland General Assembly and determined policy focus areas for the next year.

The policy areas Maryland ACEP plans to focus are as follows:

1. Mental health access
2. Workplace violence
3. Gun violence
4. Physician reimbursement models
5. Scope expansion of other healthcare professionals
