Twelve members represented you at the ACEP Council Meeting where important resolutions were debated and voted on helping to shape the mission of ACEP over the next year and beyond. Finally, our 7 Councillors listened to perspective Board Members and presidential hopefuls to help elect our next ACEP President and 4 Board of Directors' members. Unfortunately, Maryland ACEP member, Gabe Kelen, MD, who currently serves as the Chair of the Board of ACEP was not elected, and Ryan Stanton, MD from Kentucky was. I want to personally thank Dr. Kelen for his years of dedicated service to national ACEP and Maryland ACEP, and his unwavering commitment to improving Emergency Medicine for all.

There is a lot to look forward too. Maryland is scheduled to sign our next waiver with CMS in November. We should have more clarity about the AHEAD waiver and where medicine is headed in Maryland. We are working to hold a Townhall with Gene Ranson, Executive Director of MedChi, to gain additional insight on what is ahead. Look for an announcement coming soon for the Townhall in December.

Maryland Moves Forward with the AHEAD Model



Governor Wes Moore has launched a new *State Regulatory Working Group* to help advance Maryland's goals under the *AHEAD* Model, aimed at strengthening market stability, improving health care affordability, and ensuring access and quality across the state.

The group's first focus areas will be cost-shifting policies and Medicare Advantage stabilization—two key steps toward a more sustainable and equitable health system. To ensure broad input, the working group will host a virtual listening sessions for stakeholders:

ACEP Council Meeting - Salt Lake City, Utah

A report from your Maryland ACEP Councillors!

The 2025 Council of the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) convened in Salt Lake City, Utah, for a productive and impactful session. The Maryland Chapter was represented by a mix of experienced and new Councillors and Alternate Councillors:

Drs. Michael Bond, Gregory Corcoran, Kerry Forrestal, Daniel Gingold, Jonathan Hansen, Jon Mark Hirshon, Edana Mann, Patrick McCarville, Carolina Mendoza, and Debra Ravert.

The Council reviewed and deliberated on 91 resolutions, reflecting the collective priorities and concerns of emergency physicians nationwide. Of the resolutions considered, 67 were adopted, 13 were not adopted, one was withdrawn, and nine were referred—eight to the Board of Directors and one to the Council Steering Committee. The Board of Directors subsequently accepted all 65 non-Bylaws resolutions without changes and approved both Bylaws amendments adopted by the Council.

Among the adopted Bylaws resolutions were two significant recognitions: the establishment of the "Distinguished Fellow of ACEP" (FACEP(D) designation for long-standing members demonstrating exceptional commitment to the specialty, and the creation of the "International Fellow of ACEP" (FACEP(I) for members practicing outside the United States. These amendments reflect ACEP's dedication to honoring excellence and expanding its global reach.

The Council also approved updates to the College's Manual, revising procedures for addressing ethical violations and misconduct. The updated framework emphasizes transparency, due process, and the importance of maintaining professional standards within the College.

Public Health and Advocacy

Public health emerged as a central theme throughout the Council's deliberations. Resolution 89, Support for Scientific Integrity in Medicine and Public Health, was authored by Maryland Chapter President-Elect Kerry Forrestal.

It was co-sponsored by 30 individuals, including several ACEP Past-Presidents and Council Officers, plus 9 other state chapters. It recognized and commended Drs. Debra Houry, Demetre Daskalakis, and Daniel Jernigan for their work leading the CDC, and underscored ACEP's dedication to preserving the credibility of medical science through transparency, evidence-based practice, and the ethical dissemination of medical knowledge.

The Council also endorsed guidelines from leading medical organizations and emphasized the role of emergency physicians in promoting vaccine education and access, particularly in the face of rising misinformation and public skepticism.

Other resolutions addressed critical public health challenges, including firearm safety, comprehensive treatment approaches for substance use disorders, and reducing waste and improving sustainability efforts in health care. These actions reflect ACEP's broader commitment to public health leadership, recognizing the emergency department as a vital touchpoint for addressing systemic health issues and advancing community well-being.

Elections

Elections were held during the meeting. There was a close race for ACEP President, which led to a run-off between Dr. Gabe Kelen and Dr. Ryan Stanton. While Dr. Stanton prevailed, the Maryland Chapter extends its thanks to Dr. Kelen for his many years of service to the College, including two terms on the ACEP Board culminating with his leadership and Chair of the Board from 2024-2025.

Looking Ahead

The next ACEP Council meeting is scheduled for October 3–4, 2026, in Chicago, Illinois. The College extends its gratitude to all who participated in this year's meeting and to those who supported their colleagues by covering shifts back home. The 2025 Council session stands as a testament to the ongoing commitment of emergency physicians to shape the future of their profession through thoughtful governance, public health advocacy, and collective action.




